

# Hundreds of Ways To Support Local Schools ...And Learn A Lot In The Process!

When it comes to community service learning, one of the most logical options for college students is anything that involves helping children to succeed in school. In fact, many are taking this option and running with it! Ohio Wesleyan has two long-standing service learning programs that involve tutoring children: The Columbus Initiative which partners with Linden Elementary School in Columbus, and Buckeye Valley Reads which takes place at Buckeye Valley East Elementary School in rural Ashley, Ohio. Through these two programs alone about 110 OWU students tutor approximately 279 children per week. But did you know that there are countless ways that Ohio Wesleyan students can, and do, support children right here in Delaware? And many of these options are within easy walking distance of campus.

Bishop Buddies, a group started in 2003, was established with the goal of getting OWU students involved in the local schools. Bishop Buddies partners with Big Brothers/Big Sisters and Conger Elementary School. They also participate in "Family Fun Nights" which take place at various area elementary schools and are sponsored by the 21st Century Learning Program and Action for Children. In December, the Bishop Buddies helped out at the PTO "Secret Santa" event at Conger Elementary. Here, the OWU students acted as "shopping elves"—browsing gifts for sale in the gym with children and helping them pick items for their siblings, parents, grandparents and friends while staying

within the child's shopping budget. The Bishop Buddies also helped with running the cake walk, taking pictures with Santa, and making art projects in the craft room. It was hard to tell who was having more fun, the Conger kids or the Bishop Buddies!

Another partnership with The Delaware City Schools and Big Brothers Big Sisters is the new Willis Big Brothers program. Ten men from OWU have recently signed on to be Willis Big Brothers, having undergone background checks and training. The site-based after school mentoring and tutoring program is scheduled to begin on February 14th.


Speaking of Willis Intermediate School, FIJI Fraternity has been very active there helping children learn after school at "Study Island", or what the FIJIs have come to refer to as "The Willis Initiative." Service Chair, Matthew McGuire, helped to start the program so the brothers could give something back. For more than four hours each week, FIJIs tutor students in the Willis library media center and help run a computer learning program called ELO. Matt says, "It is very rewarding. The brothers enjoy helping, and the students really value the assistance we give them. In fact, recently a young gentleman invited me to his birthday party!"

The 21st Century After School Learning program at Conger Elementary is also co-sponsored by Big Brothers/Big Sisters. Monday through Thursday, Hayes High School student volunteers called "Pacer Pals" are matched up with children, helping them with homework and acting as mentors to the younger students. OWU student volunteers attend the program as mentors for the high school students. The OWU students also monitor the matches, ensuring that they are a good fit for both the older and younger students, and serving as mediators if the need arises. The OWU students are also involved in the program...helping with homework, reading stories during free time, and creating projects at different

centers set-up for the after-school care program students. They have even been known to play a game (or two) of scatter in the gym at end of the day. This program is unique because it allows the college student to interact with their peers, the Pacer Pals, as well as with the elementary children.

Sophomore Sarah Goldhammer has been tutoring in the 21st Century After School Learning Center at Woodward Elementary for two years. Twice a week she visits Woodward, helping children ranging from kindergarten through 4th grade with their homework. She also provides help in reading and math. During their free time, Sarah enjoys playing games and working on crafts with the kids. According to Sarah, "This is a program that helps provide children with many different opportunities."




